Did You Know....

The idea of Daylight Savings was first conceived by Benjamin Franklin even though it was not implemented until over a century later. During Daylight Savings Time, (called "Summer Time" many places in the world), clocks are turned forward an hour, effectively moving an hour of daylight from the morning to the evening to make better use of daylight. Daylight Saving Time also saves energy. Studies done by the U.S. Department of Transportation show that Daylight Savings Time trims the entire country's electricity usage about one percent EACH DAY with Daylight Savings Time. This means that less electricity would be used for lighting and appliances late in the day.
